General McNair serves as a senior advisor to CPS Professional Services after 32 years of distinguished military service and 23 years of corporate executive experience in US industry. His major activities and Corporate responsibilities over these years have included strategic planning, business development, capture management, budget preparation and contract execution, as well as corporate participation in professional, military, and technical association, and liaison with government organizations and legislative officials in related activities on behalf of the company leadership.

McNair joined DynCorp in 1990 as President of the Support Services Division within the Government Services Group, the company's largest operating element. In 1994, he was elevated to Corporate Vice President and named President, Enterprise management in 1995. During his tenure, annual service support revenues grew from \$61M to over \$400M, and backlog increased to over \$1.7B. Retiring as President, Enterprise management in early 1999, he moved to the DynCorp Corporate staff as Special Assistant to the President and CEO. Upon the acquisition of DynCorp by CSC in March 2003, Mr. McNair continued in his Government Relations role in the Corporate Offices of CSC, Falls Church, VA.

From 1987 to 1990, Mr. McNair was Vice President, Army Programs, with Burdeshaw Associates, Ltd., a professional services firm in Bethesda, MD. Earlier, he served the U.S. Army for over 32 years in key Research and Development, Infantry, and Army Aviation command and staff positions. These included Deputy for Aviation to the Assistant Secretary of the Army, Deputy Director of Requirements and Aviation Officer, U.S. Army; Commanding General, U.S. Army Aviation Center; and Commandant U.S. Army Aviation School. In 1983, he became the first chief of the Army Aviation Branch upon its designation as a Combat Arm of the U.S. Army. He culminated his military career as the Deputy

Chief of Staff for Combat Developments and Chief of Staff, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command retiring in the grade of Major General in 1987. Overseas assignments included Vietnam, Korea and Taiwan with combat service spanning six campaigns during the active conflict in the Republic of Vietnam, 1967-69. During this period, he flew over 1,500 combat flying hours, serving both as Commander of an Assault Helicopter Company, and Operations Officer of a Combat Aviation Group, as well as Commander of a Combat Aviation Battalion, receiving four awards of the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star with "V" for Valor, 53 Air Medals, and multiple service awards from the U.S. and allied nations. In addition, he holds two awards of the Distinguished Service Medal, the Army's highest peacetime award, three awards of the Legion of Merit, three awards of the Vietnam Cross of Gallantry, the French Legion of Honor, and many other decorations from the Republic of China, Vietnam and Korea.

Mr. McNair's academic credentials include a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, Bachelors and Masters in Aerospace Engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology as well as a Master of Science in Public Administration from Shippensburg University. For academic achievement in Aerospace, McNair was elected to SIGMA GAMMA TAU, a national honorary engineering fraternity. Listed in "Who's Who in America" since 1987 and "Who's Who in the World", he was inducted into the Army Aviation Hall of Fame in 2004, for his many contributions to U.S. Army Aviation, which included service as the first Chief of the Army Aviation branch upon founding in 1983.

In addition, Mr. McNair is affiliated with numerous professional organizations, including: the American Helicopter Society, the Army Aviation Association of America, the National Defense Industrial Association, the Navy League, the Association of the U.S. Army, Order of Daedalians, Military Order of World Wars and the Military Officers Association of America. He also serves as an outside Director and Chairman of the Audit Committee on the Board of Air Methods Corporation located in Denver, Colorado, the largest publicly held provider of emergency medical transportation systems and services in the U.S. as well as Chairman and member of numerous other company boards over the years.

Active in community affairs throughout the National Capital Region, he is a member of many non-profit Boards and Foundations, including the Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors and former Trustee of the associated BizPAC; Board member Emeritus, Easter Sears of the Greater Washington Region; Board; George Mason University Civil Engineering Institute; Shippensburg University Alumni Association, the Army Historical Foundation and the Army Aviation Museum Foundation, Washington Chapter of NDIA, George Washington Chapter of AUSA, Third Region, AUSA and his USMA Class of 1955. He also served as Chairman and President of the Arlington National Cemetery Commemorative Project, providing a pictorial history of Arlington for the families of service members killed in the Global War on Terror since 9/11 and now interred at Arlington. For this contribution to the Army, he was awarded the Secretary of the Army Public Service Award in 2007. He was further honored in 2008 by the West Point Society of DC with the Castle Memorial Award as the graduate who has most distinguished himself in both a military and civilian capacity achieving success in a second career outside the military. The Army Aviation Association of America recognized him in 2009 with their President's Award for 50 years of service to Army Aviation. In 2010, the Association of the US Army awarded General McNair their prestigious Creighton W. Abrams Medal at the Association's Annual Meeting and Exposition in Washington, DC.

He and Jo Ann, his wife of 53 years, currently reside in Springfield, Virginia, and have three children, Cynthia M. Wood, Denver, CO, Carl III, Uniontown, PA, Courtney M. Bulger, Oak Hill, VA, six grandchildren, and one great grandchild.
